From our Executive Director

To see countless stories of changes in lives of adolescent girls and the smile on faces survivor women are like awards for us. Vikalp has been working vigorously to empower girls and women in Rajasthan since 2003. Our journey began with working in Barmer with group of friends dedicated to gender equality and now we are working in 12 districts of Rajasthan for upliftment of women. We not only focus on empowering women and girls, but also on engaging and sensitizing men and boys, as we believe participation of all parties, not just



those experiencing discrimination, is a crucial step in creating a gender-just society. There has been inadequate attention paid to the situation of young married girls. Being one of the most vulnerable section of society we bring their issues in mainstream.

I understand, changing mind-sets of community is a slow process and challenging. Primary concern of parents of a girl child is marriage instead of education. Women are facing gender based violence and discrimination in some or the other way. But Vikalp has been successful in transforming lives of thousands of girls and women by providing them knowledge and tools.

2018-19 had been a great year for us and we could not have done this alone. Through dialogue we foster women empowerment and motivate people around the country to rise voice against injustice, discrimination and challenges faced by them which negatively affects people within a society. We mobilize likeminded organizations and individuals to bring an end to gender based violence and discrimination by active participation.

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
About Vikalp

At Vikalp, we believe in a violence-free society which does not discriminate on the basis of gender; which has equal opportunities, justice and freedom for all.

Mission

To empower youth to end gender-based violence and discrimination through creating alternative and creative ways for them to voice their opinions, integrating them in the process of social development and creating a future which is just and equal for all.

Our Strategy

Youth are our future leaders. Vikalp firmly believes that by changing the attitude of youth to gender equality – helping to inculcate a sense of justice, equality and independent thought – we can create a better society for our next generations. One of Vikalp’s key strategies therefore is to work with youth by sensitizing them to gender issues. Through them, we create awareness in the community, sensitize others to the various discriminations faced by women, help the survivors of violence and also advocate for policy changes from the village to the state level.

Vikalp also believe firmly that in order to change discriminatory gender norms and practices, it is necessary to engage with men. After all, whole societies cannot move forward when only the mindsets of one half are changed. We work directly with fathers, husbands, brothers and sons, and seek to mobilize these male decision-makers to become role models in their own families and communities. Vikalp encourages men to challenge the norms that perpetuate gender violence and work to create communities that nurture the rights of women and girls and allow them to reach their full potential. Our Approach:

Vikalp aims to target the issues of gender discrimination and violence in a holistic way, including by:

- Conducting public awareness campaigns led by youth volunteers, Change makers and community partners
- Conducting discussion forums at local level build community awareness and capacity around preventing gender discrimination
- Advocating to local governments and community leaders on issues facing women
- Motivating community members to address gender based issues through various networks and support groups, as well as links with government and other institutions
- Raising awareness in local media and increasing coverage on issues around violence against women
- Sensitizing men to the experiences and issues facing women
- Holistically empowering survivors of violence, providing women with access to legal services, counseling, and regular follow-up
- Developing and encouraging self-respect and self-worth in women and young girls, to assist women in recognizing their inherent value and strength.

Our Programs-

Vikalp is working with patriarchal and orthodox communities in 12 districts of Rajasthan to end gender based violence and discrimination by promoting education of girls, sexual and reproductive health of women eventually leading to decrease in child marriage. Vikalp empowers women and young girls to fight against injustice, discrimination, customs restricting women's mobility and freedom such as PardaPratha (veil system). Equal inclusion of women in development would help alleviating poverty, social exclusion and contribute in development of country.

Hence, Vikalp conducts regular meetings at village and block level and enlighten adolescent girls and women on Prohibition of Child Marriage Act, Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act (POCSO), menstruation and menstrual hygiene and many more. We interact with parents and community leaders to promote education/sports and tear down gender barriers and discriminations. It also becomes a platform for participants to share their issues and collectively try to resolve it. This led to formation of a volunteer base in villages, communities, schools and colleges who are acting as change makers and fighting against injustice bringing sustainability in society.

To bring about a lasting change, it is important not only to empower women but also involve the men in the process and transform their understanding of women and their issues. Hence we also take sessions with young boys and men to enable them to act as agency of change.



Meri Khushi

Gender-based violence (GBV) is the most extreme expression of unequal gender relations in society. Girls are considered as liabilities of the family and they are extra burden for parents as they do not participate in income generation activities moreover custom of dowry makes situation of girls worse for that matter. Meri Khushi, that is 'My Happiness' is an initiative by Vikalp to help girls find their happiness by providing them knowledge, perspective, skills and enable them to participate in decisions that affect their lives. Girls suffer a worse fate as the social fabric continues to remain fragmented on the lines of gender, caste and economic class. In this program, we empower girls to break stereotypes and fight against irrational practices.

Leadership and Capacity Building Workshops

Vikalp conducted various leadership and capacity building workshops with young girls and women to empower them to shape their own lives. It helped them to become in charge of their own life, form perspectives and encouraged them to act as role models. They are given in depth knowledge on girls' rights, laws, demerits of early marriage and gender-based violence. Workshops improved their leadership and decision making skills. Different activities are conducted to elevate self-confidence and nurture future leaders to fight against inequality and discrimination.

Various panchayat level workshops were conducted as per the modules developed by Vikalp. Girls do not have proper information on sexual and reproductive health which has negative impact on their health. Malnourished mothers give birth to malnourished child and thus, cycle goes on. Through various exercises girls and women developed understanding regarding their health, hygiene and made them strive to break the chain of social injustice and inequality.



Empowerment Workshop-

Women are stuck in the never-ending cycle of household work. Young girls are married at early age and overburdened with responsibilities. In this process, their education and ambitions are side-lined. Disadvantages to girls and women are magnified. Hence, Vikalp conducted empowerment workshops to emphasis on dreams, education and to motivate women and girls to stay focused to achieve their goals in life. We conducted dream exercise where girls and women were asked to draw where they see themselves in next 10 years. Brainstorming sessions were conducted to acquaint them with hindrances in achieving dreams and pathology to vision. Workshop encouraged everyone for organic growth by continues efforts and enhance acquired skills. Through Vikalp's efforts many restarted their education.

Workshop focused on different aspects like body, work, money, emotion, relationship, sexuality and spirituality and relationship between them. It is important to maintain balance between all for success in life. They were encouraged to learn from other's experiences and indulged in peer learning. We show cased motivational short movies like story of Karoly Takacs, an Olympian who switched to shooting with his left hand after injuring his right and won gold medal in 25 metre rapid fire pistol event. It marked perseverance as the key to success. Workshop taught values and core beliefs like determination, positivity, self-commitment, discipline, self-love, follow your inner voice and find your own truth. It empowered them to take active steps against female subjugation.

Digital Story Workshop-

Gone are the days when photojournalists were only men. A 5-day workshop was conducted in April 2018 where girls from Mavli Block learned photography and videography. All Muslim women from Sanatkada film studio, Lucknow took sessions with girls on use of modern technology, briefed them about techniques to take pictures and videos with help of mobile phones. Vikalp also provided them laptops for hands on exercise to make digital video story in groups. This attempt to combat sexism within a profession inspired girls to break stereotype.

Meri Khushi Camp-

Vikalp organised Meri Khushi day-camp from 15th May to 30th May, 2018 to kindle the minds of adolescent girls to be limitless and challenge cultural norms suppressing their desires and dreams. 109 young girls engaged in discussion on topics such as child marriage, domestic violence, reproductive health, importance of education and becoming self-dependent. It was to inculcate a sense of gender equality, justice and increase self-worth and break the prison of patriarchy. Vikalp conducted daily classes in English, Computer, life skills and Self-Defence. There were different sessions on health and hygiene. This camp gave girls' an opportunity to leave their homes, learn valuable life and employability skills, and be mentored by strong female role models.



Gender and Career Fair-

Vikalp organised Gender and Career Fair reached out to 1116 young boys and girls. This fair was to transform discriminatory attitudes, gender norms and stereotypes related to gender-based work and show path to youth to fulfil their dreams along with various available career options. Vikalp endeavours to empower girls to advocate for their futures, and to negotiate with their families and their communities for their education, dreams and equality.

Vikalp made people aware about different government policies and schemes like PalanharYojna, widow pension, old age pension, and disability pension and enrolled them as per eligibility criteria to avail financial and other benefits. At the fair, we also distributed information about different courses and degree programs which the girls could attend after completing school.





Sports for Empowerment

Sports have the power to influence and create social change. Sports can unite youth from diverse cultures and economic backgrounds to take actions collectively against injustice. It helps them to build greater confidence, self-esteem and better understanding of physical and mental health. Sports for Empowerment program was initiated in 2014 to advocate for equal opportunity and gender inclusion through sports. We leverage the power of play to help adolescent girls and young women to build leadership skills and become better equipped to exercise their rights.

We train young girls' rules and techniques of playing round the year. Along with this, Vikalp team takes regular sessions with girls on issues related to health, importance of sports in life and right to exercise all kinds of freedom. Vikalp also takes counselling sessions with parents to support girls in their journey. Girls are inspired by sports person like Sania Mirza, Mary Kom, Saina Nehwal, Geeta Phogat and many more. Abandoned lands in a corner of villages become alive with girls whizzing around with volleyball. Girls also participate in male dominated games like Judo and Korfball. They are acquainted with Universal and Olympic values of friendship, joy of

effort, fair play, respect, excellence and balance of body, spirit, will and mind as well as tolerance.

Block level matches and Sports camp-

Vikalp created several all-girl volleyball teams in a number of rural villages where the risk of child marriage, violence and dropping out of school was particularly high for girls. Two block level matches were conducted to promote sports among girls in villages. We also organised sports camp in Udaipur (Gandhi ground) in which Volleyball and Kabbadi tournament was conducted between 19 all girls' teams. To encourage them, winners were awarded with trophy. Girls enhanced their negotiation skills and learned time management, sportsperson ship and mutual respect. Sport is not only a successful tool for the empowerment of girls and women on its own; most crucially, it can be used as an inroad for socialisation, networking and mobility. 20 all-girls volleyball teams, 10 all-girls kabaddi teams, and 5 mix-gender netball teams have been established.

Meet our Volleyball Player-

Devkuwar from Mavli Block was teased by her family and friends for being exceptionally tall. She was ashamed of her height and would bend a bit while walking. Under Vikalp's Sports for Empowerment program she started playing volleyball. Her height became an advantage to her. Now she takes pride of her height while bringing trophies back home. Volleyball boosted her confidence and made her will stronger. Taunts on her and her height turned into compliments.





Youth for Equality


Vikalp believes that to bring about a lasting change, it is important not only to empower women but also involve men in the process and transform their understanding regarding women and their issues. Men are also product of patriarchal society; therefore, they also have similar mind-set which restricts women's mobility. Vikalp has given focus on sensitizing young boys and men as we consider youth as a "change maker". Through interaction and workshops, Vikalp has successfully changed way of thinking of this section of people in society who had different perspective on gender-based norms, power of patriarchy, rights of girls and women and violence. This program was initiated to make boys and men act against injustice and discrimination in community and promote positive gender roles. As years passed by, several challenges were faced yet Vikalp's continuous efforts yielded stories of change in the lives of young men and adolescent boys.

EkSaathAbhiyan-

A national level campaign from 8th June to 9th June, 2018 was to capture the felt need of gender justice. Rural masses from 72 villages identified problems and discriminatory practices followed in different areas. They not only have challenged social norms that reinforced gender and masculinity but also have developed equitable attitudes towards women and girls. They are sharing their experiences with their peers and encouraging them to adopt equitable action and practice for gender equality.

Couple Workshop-

Vikalp has been working with men and women to prevent and eradicate gender based violence. It was realised that working with couples would significantly help in eliminating intimate partner violence. Therefore, for the first time, to bring long lasting change, Vikalp organized a couple workshop named “Zindaginamilegidobara” (We Live Only Once) to deepen understanding and make strong bond between couples by sharing and appreciating each other. The workshop was held from 17th February to 19th February 2019 in Mount Abu. It aimed to provide a safe space to them where they can express themselves, learn from each other and enjoy three days away from their mundane life. Following were the outcomes:



The event was basically designed to bring everyone on a single platform and share valuable information and help in making couples work collectively for better and violence free life.

Gender, Caste and Masculinities

This workshop was organised to make young boys aware about patriarchy, cast, masculinity, power and gender equality. Jagdish Chandra from Centre for health and Social Justice, New Delhi acted as resource person. To foster innovative, participatory learning methodologies we organized plays, group activities, games and role plays to deepen their understanding on issues like violence, use of abusive language, gender based work and eve teasing. There were positive implications of the workshop as men and boys started supporting their daughter and sisters for higher education and helping in house hold chores. They are actively participating in village level meetings and raising voice against child marriages and other practices. Vikalp volunteers were also part of the workshop who developed perspective and could apply their learnings to work on field.

Capacity Building Workshops-

Fatalism is the tendency to perceive and believe that there is nothing one can do to change an outcome, therefore one's choice really doesn't matter, and that human beings are powerless to change outcomes in life. In order to bring change in the fatalistic attitude we conducted various leadership, empowerment and capacity building workshops with young boys and men to make them agency of change. We enlightened them with knowledge on child marriage, human rights, domestic violence and laws. We provided them with tools and skills to challenge patriarchal power structures to participate in building stable, peaceful nations. Workshops formed perspectives of young boys and encourage them to act as role models.



Vikalp Helpline and Support Centre for Women and Girls

Violence against women remains embedded in our societies and homes turn into torture chambers. Vikalp observed that women and young girls face atrocities like domestic violence, matrimonial cruelty, sexual harassment, rape, acid attack, dowry, female foeticide, cohabitation with a false promise of subsequent marriage and many more which is insulting or outraging the modesty of a woman. Women hesitate to share their problems and proper care and counselling is not available to them. They are also being failed by the very legal frameworks that are meant to protect them. Therefore, Vikalp Sansthan felt the need for setting up a Help line number and a counselling centre to help the survivors of gender-based violence and women who face atrocities. Vikalp had been working with survivor women and girls from its initiation. Earlier, Vikalp ran two counselling centres in Jodhpur and Nagaur district in collaboration with women and child department of Rajasthan and Police for 5 years each. After 14 years of experience to work with survivors Vikalp inaugurated its 'Helpline and Support Centre' on 20th September 2017.

We provide counselling to women, their spouses, and their families until the problem is resolved and have psychological and legal services available for those who need them. We help survivor in filing court case against perpetrator, drafting case, preparation for hearing and provide free sessions with a legal advocate. We provide emotional support to person in distress and offer access to information/advice and redress their grievances. We offer holistic solutions to problems and keep cases confidential and non-judgemental. The centre has boarding, lodging and child care facility for women who travel from various other cities and towns for help. We help them cope with the trauma of abuse. We regularly follow up to ensure survivors' safety and wellbeing. For overall development, we also connect individuals with outside resources when desired, such as short-stay homes, police, job opportunities, government schemes and education. We have two way approach where we reach out to

girls and women rather than calling them at the centre. We receive cases from all over India and with holistic approach we redressed their grievances and empower them to live life with dignity.

Our data

To maintain a power imbalance, women and girls are treated as second-class citizens whose role is to deliver babies and take care of house chores. There is lack of opportunities for women and their mobility is barred. As a result, women have few support systems within their communities to cope with the negative effects of this system. We have been working with survivor women and girls rigorously. From April 2018 to March 2019 there were total 37 cases out of which 21 cases have been resolved.

Apart from above 37 cases, 28 other cases were received from different districts of Rajasthan like Jodhpur, Barmer, SawaiMadhopur. We redressed their grievance on phone and connected them with local NGOs who can help.

Awareness workshops

Children who witnesses violence or threats of violence between parents are more likely to replicate such harmful activities later in life. Our work and intentions are not merely restricted to approaching survivors and counselling. In order to create gender impact and bring long lasting change we take sessions in schools, colleges, anganwadi and hostels on child marriage, gender-based violence, freedom of speech and choice, POCSO Act, available support structures and Helpline. In such workshops, adolescent girls and women also share their experiences of discrimination, local village problems.

Support structures and groups

We realised, due to domestic violence at home, there is an increase in dropout rate and young girls turn into forced child labour or willingly work to earn their living instead of pursuing education. Hence, it is important to work with these girls, take counselling sessions

and ensure reenrolment in schools. Daughter group of girls have been formed who are fighting for their rights and against domestic violence. Girls are taking leadership and becoming agency to raise voice against violence.

On the other hand, women support groups have been formed. These women along with other survivor women undertake group activities where they share their thoughts and experiences and inspire each other. Women and girls have support even when they are unable to access the centre creating a self-sustaining support structure in communities. Support groups of survivors are created where women and girls can encourage one another as well as provide solidarity and advice.

Networking

During outreach we focus on police, NGOs and women departments to increase participation and commitment to make society a better place to live in. Together we could raise voice against violence against women and injustice in society and collectively bring a lasting change. Police, NGOs and Media are referring survivor women to our centre. Due to pressure and advocacy, police started taking quick actions especially in rape cases. Vikalp also interacts with Anaganwadi workers and principals at schools regarding different ways to empower young girls and boys, violence, drawbacks of early marriages and drop out. Vikalp team paid visit to gram panchayats 8 times and spoke for betterment of the communities.

Exposure Tour

Exposure visit is an interesting way of learning and empowering girls with knowledge. We organised exposure visit to police station to make girls aware about its workings by exploring various department of a police station including detection, record room, interrogation, dispatch, control room, IT department. They interacted with Station House Officer (SHO) and learned to file an FIR (First Information Report), hierarchy of the police, police recruitment process, criminal & civil cases, Police Helpline numbers and most importantly Mahila desk.

Girls met women commando team in Udaipur. Dressed in blue, carrying pistols and first aid boxes on modified bikes on streets of Udaipur, the first ever lady patrolling team in India is well trained in martial arts, self-defence and weapon handling. They interacted with girls and asserted that they not only take the injured to hospital but also deal with cases of bike stunts, criminal activities, and crime against women and counselling especially in rape cases.

Girls paid visit to “Mahila Salah Suraksha Kendra” (MSSK) which exists to safeguard the interests of women and help the protection officer of the district to file Daily Incidence Report (DIR) in cases of Domestic Violence. Girls and aggrieved women can approach MSSKs for redressal of their grievances and ensure safety and security. Girls also saw “Vikalp Helpline Support Center” where these girls can approach for help. Another visit was paid to Asha Jyoti Jaipur where girls indulged in discussion on importance of girl child and her education.

Meet our heroes

Neha (Changed Name), age 35 years, a resident of Udaipur was married with Harish 9 years ago. After marriage Neha and Harish had disputes and Neha became victim of domestic violence. After delivering a girl child, she left Harish's home and started leaving at her parent's house with her baby girl. She shared her problem to women counselling centre at women police station Udaipur but no action was taken. Neha's friend DivyaOdh connected her to Vikalp helpline and Support Centre. Vikalp team took counselling sessions with Neha. Team had a counselling session with her parents, Harish and his family. They agreed on few demands of Neha like no use of abusive language and violence, Neha would continue her job and meet her parents on a regular basis. Centre organised a joint meet at last and made them resolve all issues for a better life and future. Centre team wrote a stamp paper about both parties' statements.



Results-

- Neha and her daughter living with Harish.
- She is continuing her job.
- Harish is giving money for home expenses.
- He has become a completely changed man.



Celebration and Mobilisation

16 Days of Activism

Vikalp endeavours to empower girls to advocate for their futures, and to negotiate with their families and their communities for their education, dreams and equality. **16 Days of Activism** against Gender-Based Violence Campaign was celebrated to galvanize action to end violence against women and girls around the world. 2500 people participated in the campaign from 25th November (the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women) to 10 December (Human Rights Day). Lots of posters, newsletters were used during rally. A special event was organized by Vikalp on 10th December where participants indulged in discussion on domestic violence, freedom of opinion, choice, expression, right to work and education. Everyone understood that everyone is entitled to these rights irrespective of their caste, creed, gender and religion.

International women's day

On 8th March 2019, Vikalp celebrated **international women's day** with 200 women participants. We discussed issues like right to work without discrimination, women's rights and celebrated womanhood.

International day of girl

To ensure that child marriage and gender based violence is eradicated from within the society, on the occasion of **international day of girl** on 11th October, Vikalp organized sessions in schools on topics related to child marriage, good touch, bad touch and gender based discrimination.



Dignity march

Sexual harassment constitutes a gross violation of women's right to equality and dignity. An initiative to end sexual violence against women and children we organised a **dignity march** and bring justice for women despite all the setbacks they face



Young Married Girls

Most Indians lack access to institutional services and the ability to enjoy their constitutional rights even today, especially those living on the margins of society. Young married girls (YMG) face the worse fate. Child marriage lead to early pregnancy and that effects their overall life stealing the youth and innocence of girls. Isolated from support networks, lacking adequate education, and with little autonomy over their lives, YMG are a very susceptible population to domestic violence, adolescent pregnancy and ill health. However, they rarely seek help as they are overwhelmed by housework and childbearing, and are confined to their homes by stern expectations of how married women should act. We worked with YMG to empower these women, implement programs to assist them, and conducted more research to better understand them. We enrolled them in schools and encouraged to dream again.

A national level seminar on “Situation of Young Married Girls” was conducted from 26th February to 27th February 2019 wherein participants from 30 different organization shared their experiences along with researchers, practitioners, academicians and policy makers. Vikalp shared thoughts on “young married girls” and showed actual picture of state of girls (staying with in-laws) in villages of Rajasthan with help of data (through research conducted by Vikalp in 2017). Vikalp was successful in making people aware about unspoken issues related to young married girls. Social workers and people passionate about the cause recognized young married girls as vulnerable and started discussing on issues related to them, bringing the issue in mainstream. Through dialogue we could foster women empowerment and motivate people around the country to rise voice against injustice, discrimination and challenges faced by these girls which negatively affects people within a society. It mobilized likeminded organizations and individuals which can be helpful in dealing with the issue to a large extend by active participation.

Outcomes

Vikalp is successful in stopping and delayed 8000 child marriages, re enrolling 10000 girls in schools and redress grievances of more than 2000 women and girls facing atrocities till date.

- There is a positive shift in attitudes of parents and communities towards girls. There is change in mind sets where girls are supported by their communities and parents to pursue education and play.
- More than 400 girls are playing every day. Increasing interest and participation in sports is leading to decrease in child marriage.
- Girls who participate in sports have higher self-confidence, stronger social support systems and improved physical and mental health. They are learning about sportsmanship, leadership skills, nurturing a healthy competitive spirit, understanding their bodies and athletic abilities.
- Eliminated restriction on mobility. Girls participated in District level open (under 16) volleyball tournaments and some young boys and girls represented Rajasthan state at national level netball championship in Mumbai. Their mobility is making them independent and boosting their confidence.
- They have developed understanding on issues like gender based violence/discrimination, reproductive health, realised importance of education, equality and right to freedom.
- Girls developed negotiation skills and have become fear less. Women and girls are raising voice against injustice in community and at homes.
- Women and girls are changing gender stereotypes in their own family spaces.
- Girls and women are learning new skills and taking initiatives to make their lives better. Women are participating in family decision making.
- There decrease in dropout rate. More and more girls and young married women are restarting their education every year.
- Girls, young married women learned how to take special care of cleanliness during menstruation and have started educating the other women in their family on the issue
- Vikalp had been informing about different government policies and social schemes. As a result, more than 100 people enrolled themselves and are now enjoying its merits.
- Women have learnt to believe in themselves, improving their self-esteem. They have developed healthy mind-sets about their body image and have started voicing their concerns at Gram Sabha meetings and attending block level meetings as well.
- Women, girls and boys support group are fighting against social norms and practices. There are acting as change makers in their own community and spreading awareness on gender based violence, child marriages and so on.


